• O the growing demand for Cacti, we offer our Spring List of 1895, including a number of little known and absolutely new varieties from the islands and mainland of Lower California and elsewhere, at greatly reduced prices. Small plants will be sent postpaid by mail. When sent by express, larger plants will be supplied, or extras put in to help cover express charges.

When you receive your Cactus, cut off all bruised roots, set on a bed or deep box of sand and soak with water. Do not water often, but do not let the sand quite dry out. When the plant is rooted, pot off or plant. See that your soil is well drained and water plentifully in growing weather.

For the benefit of clubs, etc., we will supply *five* plants of a kind at the price of *four*; or will give a discount of ten per cent. on all orders of more than ten dollars. This discount does not apply to "Special Offers."

NOTE.—We have discarded, on the advice of some of the best botanists in America and Europe, the use of the generic name Cactus, in place of the better known Mammillaria, as being confusing and at present unadvisable.

- CEREUS COCHAL, Orcutt. A tree-like species, bright green, with few strong black spines : \$1.00 to \$2.50.


